3-MINUTE THOUGHT

The lasting impact of The Jazz Singer went beyond the demise of the silent movie era. The film also brought African-American music to white audiences. Many African-Americans at the time of the film's release embraced the struggle of Jolson's character. But its use of 'blackface', a technique common to early 20th-century white performers whose performances all too often mocked rather than respected African-American culture, has remained a source of controversy.
